

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




Matilda Mouse and her Fortuitous Encounter with Jed and Maggie and Annali and Eriselle



At first she thought it was the wind blowing two branches together, but then she remembered that Mommy had pulled down the window just before she tucked her into bed.




It was not a scary noise, but she did wonder what was making it and where it was coming from.




So she reached under her pillow for the flashlight she always always kept there and pulled it out and switched it on.











Shrip. Shrip. The noise would stop for five seconds and then start again. Where could it be coming from? What was making the noise?






Matilda said, "Thank you so very much. You are splendid friends indeed! My children are very tired. It has been good to see you but it is time for you to leave."



And then she and her babies was gone.






and Maggie told her class how she had found the car keys her mother had lost
